This committee has also offered us different liturgical resources to use in support of individuals who identify as LGBTQ, (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer).

I would like to share some of these resources with you. First, let us pray...

We pray for people of varying sexualities and gender identities – that they may love and be loved, and that we might create communities where love is nurtured and human dignity restored. God of love: hear our prayer.

We pray for all who are still in the closet, who must hide for fear of reprisal and whose lives are not safe. May they know Your love for them remains true even when they are hidden from view. God of love: hear our prayer.

We pray for all who have suffered rejection of family and friends because of their sexuality or gender identity. May they have grace and courage to find new ways forward, and receive the gift of chosen family. God of love: hear our prayer.

We pray for all those whose lives are bound in mutual love, but whose existence has only been recently recognized by the church and government. With gratitude for institutions that move slowly, but do move: God of love: hear our prayer.

We pray for the church – that our leaders may proclaim the Gospel of love and find a way to welcome the many gifts of all people as we work towards the realm of God. God of love: hear our prayer.
