FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



The Music of the Word

"The world of the ear is more embracing and inclusive than that of the eye can ever be.."
-- Marshall McLuhan

When Marshall McLuhan said, "The world of the ear is more embracing and inclusive than that of the eye can ever be, "he was getting at something simple but true: listening draws-us-in differently than looking does. What we merely see can feel distant or separate from us, but what we hear feels close — even personal. That's especially true when it comes to hearing the Word of God.

When Scripture is read aloud, it comes to life in a new way. It has tone, rhythm, and breath. It fills the room. And it connects us — to the reader, to each other, and to God. That's part of what's making this summer's gospel reading project so meaningful. We're not just reading with our eyes — we're listening with our hearts. And we're discovering the way the gospel was always meant to be. To be heard.

Do you remember a time before smartphones, when we used to memorize phone numbers by the way they *sounded*? There was a kind of music in them when we said them out loud. I think many of us can still remember at least one number this way . For me, it's this one: 254-3870 — the telephone number of my childhood home. It begins with a slow roll and builds to a gentle crescendo on the final "oh." It's a familiar rhythm, and even now, it's music to my ears.



I've come to think, the same kind of rhythm — the cadence of spoken words — is something we miss when we only read silently to ourselves. When we listen, especially to Scripture, we hear patterns and phrases we might otherwise overlook. The words land differently. They take root in us in a new way.

That's part of what is happening in this summer's ministry project, *Reading the Gospels Together*. Folks from across all of our church communities on the Bruce, have been gathering at Christ Church in Lion's Head to hear all four gospels read aloud — not studied in depth, not picked apart line by line — but simply *heard*.





As John writes in his gospel:

"When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice" (John 10:4).

This summer, we've been learning to listen for that voice — the voice of our Shepherd. Of course, from a study perspective, we hear the distinct voices of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John — each gospel writer offering a unique lens on Jesus' life and ministry. But in our time together, one voice rises above all others. The voice of Jesus. Steady, central, unmistakable.

Our meetings are casual. There's no homework. No pressure to comment or analyze. We simply gather and listen — our friends taking turns reading to us, sharing the word of God like a shared meal. We've come to experience the gospels not as four separate accounts, but as a kind of symphony in four movements. Together, they form one beautiful piece — and we're letting it all wash over us, fully.

There's something delightful, even healing, in encountering the gospel this way. It reminds us that the Word of God is alive, and meant to be *heard* — not just studied, but experienced. And in listening together, we're finding that the music of the Word is drawing us closer: to the text, to one another, and to the heart of Christ himself.






